### WINED & DINED with Claire Smith from No.10 The Coffee House



At the time of writing we are enduring another cold spell, but look more closely and you will see that the leaves on the trees are unfurling,

the hedgerows have become verdant carpets of fresh young grass and dogs mercury patterned with primroses and cowslips; ditches are alight with bright yellow marigolds and celandines, and shady copses are scattered with tiny star-like wood anemones and the first few bluebell and wild garlic flowers. Yesterday I spotted a cluster of wateravon just beginning to lift their delicate dusky pink heads. All this signals that summer is on the way.

It comforts me to think that no matter what is happening in this mad and often manic world of ours nature, at least, remains constant; and that whatever the weather the seasons pretty much come and go as they always have .The onset of summer brings with it the opportunity to enjoy all that nature has to offer at its freshest and most tender. New potatoes, broad beans, green beans, fresh young carrots and peas, sweet, young and succulent, which are difficult to leave alone once you start eating them. I rarely get round to cooking them - they are too delicious when eaten straight from the pod. This early blossoming, this first flush of vitality in summer food lasts only a fleeting moment; capturing this fleeting moment enables us to absorb this vitality at its most potent.

The fact that we are presented with "new" potatoes, strawberries and all manner of so called seasonal produce year round in supermarkets can mean that we often miss this moment of optimum freshness. New potatoes purchased in the depths of winter lack the vibrancy of flavour of those born in early summer soil, and I know that I'm not alone in finding the sour white flesh of the out of season strawberry but an empty promise when compared to the real thing.

Tender young vegetables need little in the way of cooking or adornment – a gentle boiling or simple steam and lots of butter will suffice. Indeed one of the most appealing aspects of summer food is its simplicity.

Sweet treats can be kept as simple as you like in summertime. Fresh strawberries, raspberries and peaches, luscious and mouth watering require only the vaguest scattering of sugar and oceans of voluptuous, velvety cream; or you could step up the sweetness a notch or two and add crushed meringue, ice cream and a rich raspberry coulis. Some friends of mine have cherry trees in their garden and I like nothing better than to pick a big bowl and eat them unadorned whilst sitting in the swing seat on the patio. As Elizabeth David says "as I understand it, summer cooking means the extraction of maximum enjoyment out of the produce which grows in the summer season and is appropriate to it. It means catching at the opportunity of eating fresh food freshly cooked". I couldn't agree more.

# Brontë Relics: An Evening with the Brontë Collection


Brontë Parsonage Museum Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> & Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> May 2012, 7.00pm

Keighley's new venue, The Exchange Arts Centre, is part of the new Musicians Centre, located in the original Keighley Employment Exchange at the top of Russell Street, built originally in 1938 for the purpose of doling out social services. Long gone are the cues for dole applicants; the only line up at The Exchange now includes northern top musical talent and budding local artists.

Exchange Arts Centre will host events in music, arts and comedy as well as providing space for conferences and exhibitions.

For the community the centre will be a space for local groups to meet, a location for classes in the arts and a focal point for entertainment in the area.

Siblings Michael Watmough and Marie Harris carry on the tradition of nurturing local talent, following in the footsteps of parents, George and Jayne Watmough, founders of the Musicians Centre. The new premises create a space to bring the three parts of the owners vision together under one roof: The Musicians Centre. a retail space; Musicians Centre Academy. the educational space; and Exchange Arts, the venue for showcasing live acts and supporting community activities.

Jym Harris, partner to Marie, heads up the live music venue. He is keen to support a community hub where people gather to meet and exchange ideas, share talent, and encourage creative output. a bit of a coffee connoisseur, Jym has



ensured that the coffee at the centre is up to scratch. Parents will be delighted to wait for their children in comfort in the new Musician Centre lounge while sipping a cafe styled cup of decent java.

#### **Has your PC got PUPs?**

I promised myself years ago that I wouldn't push myself to get any more Microsoft Qualifications. I just couldn't help myself though. It's the thrill of the challenge. I'm the same with 1000-piece jigsaws and, I admit, I am a geek. There. I said it. In Public. But don't tell anyone.

Anyway, there's me sat, in the dark, eating take away pizza and supping cans of Coke for breakfast, wearing my Black Sabbath t-shirt, jeans and flipflops (NOT!), watching an online video about <box>

technobabble omitted> when up pops an image similar to the one below. The guy doing the voiceover starts laughing. Me too. How many 'well-balanced individuals' would find this image funny? See? Told you I was a geek... Well, the point he was making is that this computer had an extreme dose

of 'PUP' (Potentially Unwanted Programs). In all likelihood the owner was probably wondering how 'resistant to impact' his double-glazing was, because he wouldn't have known how he ended up with so many toolbars on a computer now running at the speed of a slug on Mogadon.

The truth is most browser toolbars are installed inadvertently. Here's a few examples of how toolbars and other PUPs can get onto your computer:-

Bundled in with 'free' games from websites aimed at kids (who are, apparently, more likely than adults to click 'Next' or 'OK' without reading what they're agreeing to and won't notice that an option to 'Install our free toolbar/pop-up blocker/PC cleanup tool...' is selected by default).

Bundled in with 'free' clipart/music/ smiley icons/cutesy mouse pointers etc.

Virus or Malware infection

Bundled in with 'free' software utilities offering to search the web for the right drivers for your computer, clean up your registry, remove malware or make your PC run faster (Oh the irony!).

Facebook (and other social networking sites) – clicking on links appearing to come from 'Friends'

Opening or clicking on links in emails from unverified sources

In an effort to rid a computer of PUPs a user may search the web for and install 'free' performance enhancing or registry cleaning utilities, adding even more PUPs to the mix.

PUPs which are

not actually malicious in themselves are a nuisance if they use up system resources whilst other software is trying to run, or getting in the way of your web browsing.

If you notice any utilities, toolbars or other software that you (or your family members) didn't knowingly install, try 'uninstalling' them.

Most PUPs will 'go away nicely' and won't bother you again. But if they don't stay gone permanently, or your web browser is starting to look just a teensy bit like the one in the picture, seek professional help (if only to save you wasting good money later on because your computer took a shortcut into the garden and your window needs repairing). scope of the festival will incorporate a wide spectrum of activities and cultural events. Performance art, drama, dance, music, and digital mixed media happenings will create a unique experience and a platform from which residents can take part and enjoy.

his fledgling festival aims to be sustainable with a structure that will enable it to raise funds and support the cultural heritage that is unique to Haworth with its vital artistic community at its heart.

Haworth Festival missed out on most of the funding opportunities this year but with the goodwill that exists and the help of established groups, volunteers and business sponsors, hopes remain high for an inspired line up. Here is a taste of whats in store so far:

# Haworth Festival

pening the festival will be a world premier live streaming multimedia event from Top Withens, the atmospheric location that captures the spirit of the local landscape and resonates with global audiences. The connection with the Brontes is never far away, but the emphasis will be on modern interpretations and relevance. Back in the village of Haworth and through out the week, there will be art workshops, an open mic session, book readings, storytelling events, an out door art trail, live music sessions, a Kathy Kirby tribute event, cafe exhibitions, a Shakespearean drama, a garden party, and more. Scartop will host a number of Family activities in the first weekend. On the final weekend Haworth Festival will join in a Jubilee event in Central Park called The Mad Hatters Tea Party that will appeal to all ages.

Keighley Festival and Haworth Festival share the same aims to bring the local communities together for a season of celebration and fun. The committee members of both festivals are pleased to work in partnership wherever possible and promote each others activities for the good of the Aire & Worth Valley residents. # Vintage fashion is a Passion



I was recently asked to visit an elderly lady in York who had some "old" dresses she wished to sell. "They are too good to throw away" she said as she carefully lifted from its box and neatly folded tissue paper an exquisite 1950s couture gown made

of black taffeta with tiny pink roses embroidered on the bodice. "I wore this to a garden party at Buckingham Palace, I had it made in London" she explained. Her husband used to be high up in local government. She showed me some pictures of her wearing the dress.

Vintage fashion has a history, its special. It is preserving a part of our past. We have recently seen a fresh demand for vintage clothes due to fashion trends and the wish to be individual. Customers vary from young students looking for something funky and different to a 1940s vintage connoisseur searching for a ditzy little hat or vintage suit.

What defines whether a piece is vintage is up for much debate. Many say it just has to be pre-1980s. Some say they have to be designer made. I say look for iconic pieces that really make a statement about the styles of the decade. Choose quality fabrics and look at how well it has been made. The following tips may help you date your item:

### Dating vintage garments:

- Washing care labels were introduced in the 70s.
- Standard dress sizes came in with mass production in the 60s. But a 1960s size 18 will be a modern size 14.
- Overlocking machines came into use in the 60s to prevent edges fraying.
- Zips were in side seams of dresses until the 50s when they started to be put in the centre of the back
- CC41 is a utility label to show the garment conformed to rationing restrictions during the 40s
- As Haworth's 1940s weekend approaches, did you know that silk and nylon was used for parachutes, golf balls became gas masks and matresses were made into life jackets!

Woolton Pie was an adaptable dish of vegetables, created at the Savoy Hotel in London by its then Maitire Chef de Cuisine, Francis Latry. It was one of a number of recipes commended to the British public by the Ministry of Food during the Second World War to enable a nutritional diet to be maintained despite shortages and rationing of many types of food, especially meat.

#### **Woolton Pie**

#### **Ingredients:**

1lb diced potatoes

1lb cauliflower

1lb diced carrots

1lb diced swede

3 spring onions

1 teaspoon vegetable extract

1 tablespoon oatmeal

A little chopped parsley

#### Method:

Cook everything together with just enough water to cover, stirring often to prevent it sticking to the pan. Let the mixture cool.



Spoon into a pie dish, sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Cover with a crust of potatoes or wholemeal pastry.

Bake in a moderate oven until golden brown.

Serve hot with gravy.





# Kickstart helps business get off on the right foot

Christine Harker left the NHS in 2010 after 30 years' service, having risen to become a senior nurse manager.

Now she is back looking after patients once again – but this time focusing just on their feet.

She set up Heel2Toe Foot Health Care last year with support from Bradford Council's Kickstart enterprise programme and is steadily growing her list of clients.

Christine, from Haworth, said, "Given my background as a community nurse, I am comfortable with people and their own environment and don't have a problem dealing with aspects of personal care. Plus I know from experience how much good regular foot care enhances people's quality of life so my idea stemmed from there." "When I went to the initial group sessions it was really helpful to talk with other people in the same position about the positives and negatives of starting a business," added Christine.

"The biggest message was that you had to be brave to start on your own but that the help would be there if you took the plunge.

"It was always an aspiration to work for myself but knowing how to get out there and do it was another matter."

Having spent 12 months gaining a diploma in foot health care and attending a centre of excellence in Maidenhead for the practical aspect



of the course, Christine worked with Candy Squire-Watt, the Enterprise Coach for the Bradford Rural area to outline her business plan, marketing aims and networking strategy.

Christine is now a qualified Foot Health Practitioner, performing treatments such as toe-nail cutting, dealing with corns, callus and general foot care, in and around Keighley and surrounding areas, also operates a clinic at a pharmacy in Harden.

"Eighty per cent of my clients are older people who are in their own homes and have particular problems with general foot care e.g. thickened nails. The other twenty per cent are a mix of younger men and woman with foot care needs such as ingrown toe nails, callus and dry cracked heels."
