Stage 3 May 3rd 2015



After the phenomenal reception that greeted the Tour De France Grand Depart in 2014 Bradford Council is delighted the District has been chosen to host a stage of the inaugural Tour de Yorkshire. This is an event that promises to be a highlight of the sporting summer. **The race, which will be held on 1-3 May (Friday to Sunday), is expected to become a flagship cycling event** in the UK and an outstanding cycle race in the international calendar, including the participation of top international teams. It will be broadcast live on national TV and throughout Europe. The race will visit Bradford district on Sunday 3 May and will pass through the district in midafternoon.

In Bradford District & parts of Craven, the route which has been chosen by French race organisers ASO will incorporate visits to the following towns and villages: Oxenhope, Haworth, Oakworth, Laycock, Sutton in Craven, Cross



Hills, Silsden, Addingham, Ilkley & Menston.

Help to keep the route clear There will be no parking on the race route between 12 noon and 5pm, so if you normally park a vehicle on the race route you will need to move it. Full details of the route can be found at http://letour.yorkshire.com Nearby on-street parking can be used providing existing traffic and

parking regulations are adhered to. and consideration is aiven to other road users and residents. Council car parks will be open as usual. **Road Closures** The majority of the race will pass through the district using a series of rolling road closures which are estimated to last no more than an hour. There will however be some small sections of the route which will be closed to vehicles at key points. These will be still open to pedestrians and cyclists and

diversions will be in place. The following roads will be closed from around 9am until 5pm, but will reopen as soon as possible after the race has passed through: Main Street, Haworth; Holme House Lane, Laycock; Goose Eye, Laycock; Goose Eye Brow, Laycock; Main Street, Addingham and The Grove, Ilkley.

COUNTRY COOKING & FORAGING FOR FOOD For the promotion of Health & Wellbeing by Cath Bromwich



I have come across some lovely traditional dessert recipes recently, and have been

simplifying them to use on outdoor foraging escapades.

Here is one that is really just a sweet omelette, but is traditionally called after the herb that you usually put in it, even when you don't! It is called a 'Tansy' or an 'Apple Tansy', and I first found it on a website about the colony of Virginia in the seventeenth century. All the recipe variations fry chopped apple in butter, add a sweet egg custard, flavour with spice or herb, then add a range of ingredients like breadcrumbs or cream. However, I think you can get away with just using stewed apple if you want. I love bringing a very old tradition back to life and seeing what we can learn from it. Nowadays we have sweet pancakes or egg custard tarts, but I can't think of a sweet omelette that we commonly eat, as our ancestors did. So, for something a little different, try the recipe to the right.

Cath Bromwich, a Silsden resident, is a cookery teacher and forager. Her livelihood includes foraging and cookery courses, such as cooking on a budget and outdoor foraging and cooking experiences. APPLE TANSY



Cut an eating apple (ideally a Cox) into eight wedges, gently fry in a knob of butter in a medium frying pan (mine is 21cm across). The apple should soften and brown a bit - try to arrange the pieces in a pretty geometric design.

Meanwhile, make an egg custard with 3-4 eggs, a dash of milk or cream (maximum 100ml), sugar to taste (I used two rounded dessert spoons), a few pinches of cinnamon or nutmeg or some generous pinches of finely chopped tansy. Beat all this up.

Make sure the frying pan is on medium heat and has heated up again, pour the custard mixture on top of the apple, and cook until firm. Add a lid or put under the grill if the top is not cooking after a few minutes. You can sprinkle more chopped tansy on top as the omelette cooks, but beware – it has a strong flavour! As with a Spanish omelette, turn out onto a plate and slice. Then serve with cream or ice-cream. **Top tip: Think of tansy as a substitute for lemon juice & zest, and you will have a good understanding of how to use it.**

How does your **garden, grow**

Happy Growing - Steve Thorpe

I have just got back from the greenhouse where I have been pricking out cabbage, cauliflower and Brussels' sprout seedlings. By the time of publishing these seedlings

will have matured into plants ready to plant into their final growing space, once the risk of frost has gone.

If you have not grown any from seed visit the garden centre and pick up your very own grow on plants. Choose the cabbage carefully, a few of many different varieties can keep you going throughout the year. Plant those Brussels sprouts plants now and you will be eating your very own grown tasty sprouts on Christmas day.

If you want to try a cauliflower with a difference go for the novel purple variety Graffiti, which tastes good raw or in stir-fries.

You have to try some carrots, experiencing that magical feeling when you pull them up and see how big they have grown. Instead of sticking to the common orange varieties why not try Yellowstone which is really sweet and bright yellow or Purple Haze. If you have children try to grow an Atlantic Giant pumpkin. The children at Haworth Primary school grew a 7 stone one a few years ago. Just remember to give them plenty of room to grow and feed and water them regularly. If you want to stick to something small why not just grow some massive Fatboy marrows which grow up to 20kg - not so small eh?

So come on get growing. If you don't have a garden make some raised beds or plant some tyres up in your yard.

On the flower front I like to bring the old type planting back into things. The bedding displays in the Town Hall Square in Keighley have had lots of the old favourite varieties of daffodils in, followed by an influx of tulips that take over after the daffodils have died back. The boarders are full of forget-me-not and wallflowers, real old cottage garden favourites.

Why not try a packet of wildlife attracting or butterfly attracting annual seeds this summer which include all the cottage garden favourites like poppies, calendulas, cosmos, rudbeckia, scabious to name just a few.

Balancing Ambitions on the Railway



Looking ahead, 2018 marks the 50th Anniversary of the reopening of the Railway and we are keen to make the occasion in style.

Our plan is to have back in traffic one of the two locomotives that hauled the reopening train, LMS lvatt Class 2 2-6-2T, number 41241. The age of the locomotive means that the costs of overhaul are ever increasing and as a result we now find ourselves having to fund an excess of £300,000. It's great that we have been able to conduct much of the overhaul of a similar sized locomotive in-house and we will continue to do this whenever possible. not least because it's such a good way to pass skills from one volunteer to the net generation. If you are able to support the project, whether financially or by giving your time and becoming a volunteer, it would be very gratefully received. It is important that we don't get too

focused on longer-term aims, but need to balance our ambitions between the wish to see the lvatt returned to traffic and also more immediate matters.

We commence "summer" running shortly (see KWVR.co.uk), during which period trains operate seven days per week. To operate the service, we need a reliable fleet steam locomotives and it's great that another engine's overhaul should - all being well - be completed in the near future, giving us a very varied fleet to haul the trains on their journey back in time.

We have a number of special events planned, including 2-4 May, The Railway Children celebration weekend, which gives us a chance to remember how important the iconic family film was to the development of the Railway, which was filmed 45 years ago. We are then working with the 1940s group to help transport the thousands of visitors to Haworth and to help alleviate road and parking congestion. Please check www.kwvr.co.uk for further details of these events and other operational dates.

I do hope that you will consider joining our working membership to help us continue to operate and develop the Railway. As well as looking for support in fund raising for the overhaul of 41241, we are looking for new volunteers with a range of skills to help us make progress on a number of developments across the Railway. Alternatively, you can join our working membership and can be trained to fulfil a number of operational roles.

The Brontë Parsonage Museum is owned by the Brontë Society, one of the oldest literary societies in the world.

Anyone can join the Society and at present we have approximately 1500 members from all over the world. With the bicentenaries of the Brontë siblings approaching (Charlotte will be 200 in 2016), the Society is planning a programme of events and activities to attract new members, especially people aged under 25. In our next instalment of People at the Parsonage, we meet Membership Officer Linda Ling to tell us more.

Tell us a little about vourself:



During my early years my family lived in Haworth. then moved to Keighley where I've been ever since. the last 20 or so years in East Morton. I'm married with

three grown up sons, and two delightful arandchildren who my husband and I love spending time with. In my spare time you can usually find me with my nose in a book or pottering in the garden.

How long have you worked at the Museum?

I started in November 2014, so I'm still relatively new and learning my job. but I'm really enjoying the challenge of working here. It's completely different to any other organisation I've worked for; I love being surrounded by the history.

Tell us about a typical day:

There's no such thing, as anyone who works at the Museum will tell you. I try to get emails and membership admin sorted early in the day, but from then on anything can happen. I could be sorting out the printing and distribution of our member's magazine (the Brontë Gazette). liaising with colleagues to organise the Summer Festival, or chatting to current or prospective new members. I'm also in the final stages of testing a new online system so that new members can join the Society and existing members can renew their membership via our website which we hope to put live by the end of April.

What's your favourite piece in the collection? (or favourite thing about working here)

I've not had much time to explore the collection vet. but I'm amazed at the little books. They are tiny, it's difficult to imagine how the Brontës managed to write them so small, in the conditions they lived in ie no electric light, it's possible to read them with the help of a magnifying glass.

And your favourite Brontë novel?

I have to confess to being a late convert to the Brontë novels, but I'm working my way through them. My favourite so far is 'Jane Evre.'

Anything else you'd like to tell us?

We're all busy putting plans together for the AGM Summer Festival weekend in June which looks like being spectacular this year. All the events are open to anyone, except the AGM itself which is for members only. We open for bookings from non-members on 5 May and details of all the events can be found on our website www.bronte.org.uk. Given the rise in gluten intolerance and the increased demand for worthy options, the availability of ingredients like coconut flour has helped to revolutionise the world of baking. Most health food stores stock coconut flour and some of the major supermarkets do too.

This cake recipe is a good example of what is possible in terms of maximising flavour without compromising texture. You don't even have to make a song and dance about the fact that it is gluten free; the cake stands on its own merits.

For a distinctive New England flavour, you can substitute maple syrup for the honey in this recipe. I also had a few plums that were ripe when I baked this so I added them to the apples.

Ingredients

For the Apples:

- 4 apples, peeled, cored and sliced thin
- 2 tablespoons of coconut oil
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground cinnamon

For the Cake Batter:

I cup (II0g) coconut flour ½ teaspoon sea salt

- I teaspoon ground cinnamon 8 large eggs
- l teaspoon baking soda
- ½ cup (135g) plain whole yogurt
 6 tablespoons unsalted butter or coconut oil, melted
- ¹/₂ cup (9 tablespoons) honey
- l tablespoon vanilla extract

For the Topping:

1¹/₂ cups (225g) nuts (almonds, walnuts, pecans, cashews, etc.)

- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 4 tablespoons honey

4 tablespoons unsalted butter or coconut oil cold, cut into tablespoons Instructions

Directions Melt butter in a large saute pan and add apples. Cook for 15 minutes, stirring every-so-often until apples are beginning to turn soft. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Cool completely. Preheat oven to 350°F and adjust rack to middle position. Place all the batter ingredients in a food processor or blender and blend until smooth. Pour batter into a buttered 9-inch springform pan. Wipe out food processor bowl with a paper towel or cloth. Place nuts, cinnamon, honey and butter in the bowl of a food processor. Pulse until nuts are coarsely chopped and ingredients bind together.

Place apples on top of cake batter in an even layer (some will overlap a bit). Drop spoonfuls of topping over batter. Cover loosely with foil. Bake for 25 minutes and then remove the foil. Bake an additional 20 minutes until golden brown and a cake tested inserted in the middle of the cake comes out clean. Cool for 1 1/2 hours. Cut and serve with a dollop of clotted cream for maximum enjoyment.

PUTTING FEET FIRST

Now that the warm

weather is 'hopefully' fast approaching it may be useful to discuss how to manage and reduce complications from having sweaty feet.

Many people may feel this is reduced in the summer months especially if wearing sandals, but areas of the feet still can become sore and painful mainly due to the increase of moisture on the surface of the skin particularly between the toes.

Many of the factors highlighted below are not only due to the warm weather so many of the

'what can be done' tips will help all year round.

Sweaty Feet

Most people from time to time will suffer foot perspiration and odour; however, for some people this becomes a persistent problem, this condition is

known medically as 'hyperhidrosis' meaning excessively sweating feet.

Sweaty feet can be caused by factors such as:

- Occupational standing on your feet all day
- Feet under strain due to structural problems within the foot
- Pain
- Hot weather
- Eating spicy hot and spicy foods
- Inherited condition
- Over-active sweat glands within the feet which can be triggered by hormonal changes e.g. stress/anxiety
- Medical disorder such as an over active thyroid (hyperthyroidism)
- Wearing occlusive footwear (as worn in

industry e.g. Steel toe caps and/or trainers As well as experiencing sweaty feet, odour can also become an embarrassment. The odour (bromidrosis) is caused by bacteria on the skin breaking down the sweat. A common problem that is associated with sweaty feet is minor skin infections (bacterial or fungal) such as athletes' foot. As a result of this sweat rashes can occur on the feet. Mechanical strain within the foot can change

the integrity of the skin and perhaps cause both moisture between the toes and dryness around the heel which can then lead to

the neel which can then lead

cracked skin (fissures) What can be done?

There are a few basic

strategies which may alleviate or help reduce the problem:

 Footwear - leather shoes are preferred if possible

because they help the feet to 'breath'. Do not wear the same pair every day, let them dry out before wearing again

- Insoles that can be removed and/or aired/ washed.
- Socks that are made from natural fibres such as cotton, wool or a mixture of cotton and wool
- Soaking your feet twice a week in an anti-bacterial foot bath perhaps containing tea tree or use anti-bacterial soap such as Hibiscrub (dry thoroughly particularly between the toes) will also help in reducing problems associated with sweaty feet.
