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Keighley & Worth Valley Railway



To make our contribution to the likes of Haworth's 1940s weekend work requires our first volunteer to clock-on at 4:30am... and to help do our important bit to alleviate traffic pressure in Haworth, it takes dozens of volunteers throughout each day to run one of our most intensive timetables ever.

And the 4:30 start is not that unusual when we are having to light the fires in plenty of time to raise steam in our locomotive fleet that includes one loco that we run regularly that was built back in 1899. The skill of the steam-raiser means that when the operational crew arrives, the loco has been warmed through at just the right pace to raise steam when it's needed for the first trip of the day. Meanwhile, the guard will have arrived at Oxenhope to inspect the carriages for the day's operation, but the evening before our band of volunteers will have been out preparing the coaching stock by washing them and preparing the steam heat system to ensure that they are pre-heated for when the first passengers board on Saturday morning. Around an hour before the first train is due, the stations will be readied for the day, signalmen will

prepare for their day's duty and, if a "civil's weekend" (which is now almost every weekend due to the amount of effort it takes to keep the line in tip-top condition). the civil maintenance 'gang' will assemble. Each weekend a team walks the length of the line to inspect the track and you will often see a gang of volunteers out fettling and maintaining the railway's infrastructure.

The buffet staff will be getting the kettles boiling and the shop staff opening up the retail outlets, ready to greet passengers in need of refreshment or a flag to wave excitedly at the passing trains.

We have station staff ready to direct passengers to the main event in Haworth. help them on and off the train and check that the doors are safely closed prior to departure, as well as provide help and advice to first-time visitors.

As you will appreciate, running the core timetable requires all of the above, and it's even more demanding when we run the 1940s weekend operation. With so many special events to meet passenger demands and to encourage more people to visit the area, we really do need your help to keep the increasingly elderly wheels turning. Please do visit the website to see the range of activities and roles that it takes to run the railway and to see the number of events that we have planned.

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

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

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Walking in the Aire by Lee Senior

Keighley to Park Wood, Thwaites Brow, Twines & Thwaites (circular)

Maps required: OS297 Explorer Lower Wharfedale & Washburn Valley Walk Distance: 2.3 miles (3.7km)

This walk can begin at either Keighley bus or railway station. Whichever start point you choose both link up in Keighley town centre after a few minutes at Coney Lane off East Parade. The description assumes a starting point at Keighley Railway Station.

With our back to Keighley railway station, leave the cobbled forecourt by bearing left along Bradford Road. Continue past the petrol station on East Parade to the road junction with Coney Lane. The route from the bus station links up here.

Turn left here along Coney Lane, crossing the narrow road bridge carefully, using the footpath if possible. The road can be surprisingly busy.

Go under the railway bridge directly in front of us via a narrow archway. The bridge carries the delightful K&WVR steam railway on its way from Keighley to Oxenhope.

Continue up the tarmac footpath ahead. As the path swings right we cross over a disused railway line. Proceed on the minor cobbled road ahead rising gently to meet Moore St. Take this side road to reach Parkwood Street at the top. Turn left before crossing the road near Parkwood primary school. Continue along the road for a very short distance. Turn right and walk up Brow St (the second road on our right after the primary school). Keighley Young People's Centre is noticed immediately on our left before we reach

the top of this short road.

At the top, turn left onto the wide, uneven track. Good views of Rombalds Moor are apparent now in the far distance. We almost immediately pass a play park on our left. Go along the track a little further. Ignore the first wooden gate on our right and also ignore the next two paths (both with no gate).

Very soon afterwards we reach our waymarked path pointing right, into the wood. This is Park Wood from where this area of Keighley takes its name. Our route is directly opposite Haynes Street. Take this obvious cobbled path which soon starts to climb.

Continue as the path takes us deeper into the woods over the next few minutes. Continue upwards, still climbing also ignoring the stepped path branching off on our right. The uphill path eventually twists markedly. Why not pause for a moment to catch your breath here and enjoy the quietness of this underrated urban wood.

Soon a handrail appears to our left. You may need to use the rail to give you a "pull up" as the climb has been quite noticeable thus far!

Go through the wooden gate. After a little more climbing we reach a residential cul-de-sac at Long Lee.

Continue ahead crossing the cul-de-sac to rejoin the cobbled path which soon splits.

Ignore the fork to the right. Instead keep ahead on the level cobbled path crossing a track. Stay on the path in front of a row of houses set back on Spring Terrace to our right. Again our path is cobbled until it emerges at the end of Aireview Terrace. Now we cross the minor road



(Low Spring Road). Follow the gravel path directly in front. A gentle brief uphill section leads us to a lone boulder. Continue ahead. From here the path noticeably widens. Follow this track to the end to emerge at Thwaites Brow Road in Thwaites Brow.

Our walk continues by turning left down the road, quickly beginning a descent down the hill. This interesting and very distinctive road is known locally as the "Twines".

Vehicles do use the route but traffic flows are generally light, especially during off peak times. The road soon becomes cobbled and noticeably steep. Take care if the cobbles are wet. The panoramic views are stupendous as we carefully wind our way down the hill. Eventually the road gains a tarmac surface and levels as we weave through a small industrial area at the bottom.

Continue ahead to reach a road junction at Thwaites village.

We turn right over Thwaites Railway Bridge over the busy Airedale railway line. We quickly reach another road junction. Our walk back to the town centre takes us left here onto Dalton Lane. The last

ten minutes of our route is on this road, heading through some of Keighley's interesting industrial heritage.

Of note is the wonderfully historic Dalton Mills, a former textile mill which is gradually being restored.

Continue along Dalton lane to its junction with Bradford Road, adjacent to the college complex. Turn left here for a very short stroll to Keighley railway station and the end of our walk



Lee Senior lives in Airedale and is a very experienced walker. He has walked 19 Long Distance Paths to date; the longest being the 192 miles. Coast to Coast. Lee has

also completed the Yorkshire Three Peaks Challenge walk five times. Since becoming a dad shorter walks have also become the norm.

fter nine months of planning, training and fund raising I had finally arrived in Cusco, Peru, South America, to trek the Inca trail to Machu Picchu! I was one of 13 women, aged between 26 and 65, from all over the UK, who had worked for months to get sponsors for this trek and raise money for Breast Cancer Care. Nine of the 13 had been through breast cancer themselves. and between us we'd raised more than £70.000.

Sunday, April 2nd, 6.00am.

We left the hustle and bustle of Cusco by coach and drove along country roads to the Sacred Valley. We drove through small villages and climbed higher and higher along narrow roads. Then as we came over a hill we saw the glacier Veronique, which is as high as Kilimanjaro, at over 5000m; we could see the snow on top. We passed some glass igloos, precariously clinging to the side of a cliff where thrill seekers can stay, if they are prepared to climb the deathdefying ladder.

After a couple of hours we arrived at a makeshift bus station to meet our porters. There were 13 of us and 20 porters to carry our tents and cooking equipment, and two guides to lead the way. There were locals selling all sorts of souvenirs, including

bandanas; I bought one as it's a good idea to wear it over your nose if you have to use a portaloo! One of our group gave a little boy a banana and he kissed it, then came back with his little brother for another. We set off, rucksacks loaded, trekking poles in hand. The adventure began. After showing our passports at Checkpoint KM82 we crossed a rickety, bouncy

bridge over the fast flowing Urubamba river. We walked along through farmland, passing cacti with prickly pears on top and fertile fields. I passed an old man propping a wheelbarrow on his knees while his son rendered a wall and his wife sold fruit. After a few hours we stopped at a farm. For one sol (25p) we used their loo, which was a bit like an old outhouse. A pretty little girl of about eight collected our coins and never stopped smiling. The people are really lovely and friendly. We passed trees with avocados growing, and the whole place was so lush and green. We trekked at a steady pace and were able to walk 14km today, which was classed as the easy day!

We camped on grass that night and after an amazing meal we went to bed. I got up in the night and looked out to see the most amazing stars. I felt as if I could reach up and touch them, they were so bright and clear. There were thousands and thousands and I could see the Milky Way!

Monday, April 3rd, 6.00am.

This was our highest climb to 4215m and known as Dead Woman's Pass. We set off at a steady pace and I was doing fine. Our guide Justino was at the front with our doctor at the back of the group and

the other guide, Lewis, in the middle. They communicated on walkie talkies. I found myself at the front and found my pace. I counted in my head to keep a rhythm. It was slow going but steady. We were climbing through rain forest that was like something from Jurassic Park. I felt strong and great; I could see the peak in the distance and the path was winding its way up the side of a steep mountain. The gap was getting bigger between us as some were struggling with the altitude. I was lucky, I wasn't fazed, I knew I was doing ok. I think the adrenalin was keeping me going. We stopped for lunch. People were quiet now, as it was getting tough.

One of our group was quite ill, she had been sick and was getting dehydrated. The doctor agreed that she needed to go back, as if she were to carry on they would need to helicopter her off. They assigned her a porter to take her back down. which would take one and a half days even

farmer for her to ride. We were all very sad for her as we had become close and all felt her disappointment, but she would meet us again at Machu Picchu. The lack of oxygen was noticeable. We walked down steep granite steps for the next four hours, passing humming birds, wild orchids and amazing waterfalls. It was harder for me going down than climbing up. Night was falling as we got closer to our camp and we were greeted by the croaking of hundreds of frogs! It

after hiring a one-eyed mule from a local

Tuesday April 4th, 5.00am. We were up

was the strangest sound.

as the sun was rising over the mountain. From above the clouds it was breathtaking. Today was going to be the longest day. After a long and steep climb we looked back to see the peak of Dead Woman's Pass from yesterday and how far we had come. At the summit of today's peak, Runkaragay, we built a cairn of rocks. We each placed our own rock on the pile and paused, deep in thought. It was very quiet and still. We each had our reasons for being on this walk and this was the point at which these reasons seemed to grow in our consciousness. As each of us took time out in our own private world, it was clear that we had come together as

strangers but would leave as close friends. When we got up and walked on it was along very narrow pathways, with sheer drops. It was hard, and as the light began to fade we were now walking in small groups with head torches lighting our way. We arrived at camp late and we

were all exhausted and drained. I had been asked to collect tips from everyone to give to the porters, which makes up an important part of their wages. After our meal we gave these out and thanked them for looking after us. That night we only had a few hours sleep.



We had an amazing breakfast of pancakes and guinoa porridge and they had even baked us a cake! We set off, head torches on. Today was my favourite day. We saw the sun rise in a haze over the mountain tops. Birds were waking up and singing. The smell of the dew on the trees **cont**.



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and plants was so fresh. We walked through rainforest. Now we could see the Urubamba river again and in the distance we heard the train heading towards Aguas Calientes. With our hands we climbed the monkey steps, or "Gringo Killers" as the locals called them; it was great fun, and then our destination, Machu Picchu, was in front of us.

I could only imagine how Hiram Bingham must have felt when he re-discovered Machu Picchu in 1911. We were here, this destination that we'd been dreaming of going to for so long. Machu Picchu is one of those places in the world, like Easter Island, or maybe the Pyramids, that has a mysterious, even mythical quality, but it was no longer myth, it was reality. Here we were. We'd made it.

As we finally stepped through the Sun Gate it was shrouded in cloud. Some of us burst into tears, then we all hugged, and then we waited. We stood in silence as gradually the clouds drifted away and revealed the magnificent Sacred Site of Machu Picchu below us. We had done it. We had trekked the Inca trail. It felt like it was ours. It was our Machu Picchu. - Pam Howarth
