Sheep Cred

A flock of Worth Valley Young Farmers recently gathered at the Keighley Arts Factory to participate in the Shorn Sheep project, an initiative to bring businesses together with community groups and to consider the importance of creativity in society.

The lively group is being sponsored by the publisher of the Worth & Aire Valley magazines to paint a sculptured sheep in the style of David Hockney, Bradford's own famous son of international acclaim.

Another talented artist and teacher from Yorkshire, Sarah Hutton, has been commissioned to guide the Young Farmers and channel their creative enthusiasm in the project.

On a crisp weekend in March they

Back in the studio. Hutton continued with a quick guide to colour theory and gave the Young Farmers, now budding art students,



out ideas, discuss a design approach, and mix a colour pallete that reflected their experience of light and water in the Yorkshire landscape.

A further workshop is scheduled in April to complete the commissioned work and the finished sculpture will go on display with other painted sheep at the Sheep Fair in Keighley on April 24th followed by a diary of events to showcase the work throughout the district.

Come and enjoy a very special evening at the Brontë Parsonage Museum.



Staying overnight at the Parsonage often appeals to people. Our writer in residence, Katrina Naomi, couldn't resist imagining a night at the museum in one of her recent poems. She describes how she would infiltrate the Parsonage after closing time, boil up the copper kettle on the Brontës' stove for tea then climb the stairs to Mr Brontë's bed, put on his gown and nightcap, and dream of 'bad-boy Branwell'.

Funnily enough, not long after Katrina imagined this scenario, BBC1's The One Show had the very same idea, and sent comedian Arthur Smith to spend a night at the museum. You might have seen the programme on television in February. Arthur and the BBC film crew arrived in the afternoon and after a long evening filming at the museum, and carrying out interviews with museum director Andrew. the crew settled down for a comfortable night in their nearby B&B, leaving Arthur to sleep in the reproduction bed in Mr Brontë's bedroom. Obviously the museum isn't geared up for real habitation, so we had to remove the Brontë bedding and replace it with a duvet suitable for

a winter's night in a cold Parsonage. Hearing the church clock strike midnight. followed by every clock in the house in turn chime twelve, Arthur thought he was in for a very long night, but actually slept soundly, not waking until the church clock rang 7am. No ghosts or spooky happenings or anything to report, sadly. It wasn't such an easy experience for Andrew though, who had to stay awake for the entire night on security duty. The next morning saw further filming, with Arthur eating his porridge in the Parsonage kitchen (really cooked in the microwave in the staff room I'm afraid) before setting off on a walk to Top Withens. Poems and television programmes are the closest most of us will come to spending the night in Mr Brontë's bed, but there is the occasional opportunity to visit the house after hours. In May the museum will be hosting a series of special evening tours, with behind the scenes access, for a limited number of visitors. We can't quite stretch to the full B&B experience, but you could imagine for yourselves what it might be like to stay here, just for one night.

A MOVEABLE FEAST by Paul Slater, Archdeacon of Craven

I think it was in my youth that we stopped having a Whitsuntide holiday and a lot of the traditions that went with it - new clothes, parades and the like. We still have a Bank Holiday, of course, but it was decided back then to standardise it so that we did not have to put up with the vagaries of the Christian calendar and have the holiday the day after the feast of Pentecost. The same issue also relates to Easter. but thus far this holiday remains to the untrained eye as gloriously unpredictable as ever. In the next thirty years Easter Sunday will happen anytime between 25th March and 25th April. Every year it is on the first Sunday after the fourteenth day of the lunar month that falls after the 21st March - the vernal equinox.

This year is "not too bad" in the 4th April is neither too early nor too late but sometimes it does create problems for school terms, holidays and the run up to public exams to name but a few.

So should we standardise an early spring holiday – say the second week in April – and leave the Christian church to get on with its Easter festival in much the same way as it now does with Pentecost? Your answer to this probably depends on a number of things that come to my mind – I am sure there are lots more.

For example, temperamentally are

you the kind of person who likes

consistency or do you enjoy variety? Or do you think that public holidays should be planned so as to be as efficient as possible? Or do you think that the Christian faith has a central part to play in the life of our communities and the major Christian festivals should be marked by public holidays? Are you a committed Christian who would need to take Good Friday as a holiday if you wanted to observe Jesus' death on the cross? Or are you one of

the 70% plus in our country who believe in God in some way – and feel that public life should reflect the particular religious traditions which have shaped us historically even if we don't wish to participate explicitly in that faith ourselves?

Do you feel that we should acknowledge that we are a multi-religious society by allowing no one religion to take precedence in the public arena? Or do you feel that we are essentially a secular society and for that reason we should not get public holidays tangled up with religious Holy Days?

The date of Easter and what we do about holidays at this time of year is a complex issue which is changing all the time. Whatever our view, whatever our faith and however we express our faith, discussion of it ought to lead us to respect, transparency and a willingness to listen to each other in our communities.

Though take-away food, to the discerning customer, can be of a high standard, tasty and satisfying (I'm thinking fish and chips eaten by the seaside, the fish freshly caught

that morning: a freshly made deli sandwich or an expertly made, crisp-based pizza); the term 'fast-food' generally conjures images of food with little or no nutritional value, food designed to fill you (for at least five minutes) not feed you: food that tempts (we have all done it and lived with the guilt) but that is greasy, addictive and ultimately when eaten in any kind of quantity- harmful. The drive through fast food outlet, where you don't even have to walk the short distance to the counter to purchase your ready meal, adds even more weight to the argument that fast food equals lazy food.

Real fast food a la Nigel Slater or the incomparable Elizabeth David on the other hand is an entirely different thing. An omelette and a glass of wine after all, takes minutes to put together and will satisfy most tired and hungry souls after a hectic day at the office; the omelette itself being so versatile (and cosmopolitan-think of the Italian frittata and the Spanish tortilla) that it positively encourages the imagination to run riot.

Sandwiches, hot and cold, speedy pasta suppers, fish, which needs only the lightest touch when it comes to cooking, and many a tasty tapas dish, can be rustled up in minutes when time and energy are in short supply. A hunk of really good, soft bread, some olives and your favourite cheese

are even more instant. These are many excellent books out there brimful of recipes for meals which are quick, tasty and filling.

Conversely, some dining experiences, whilst purporting to be recreational, can be spoilt by over-zealous waiting staff. Only yesterday I had just such an experience at a well known, well respected café. As the last mouthful of food slid down by throat a waitress thrust the bill down saying 'there's no rush' in a manner expressing just the opposite, turning what should have been a leisurely lunch into a fast-food experience.

Sometimes we are our own worst enemy. I have lost count of the times that I have heard people say after eating 'I am going to walk it off in a minute'. Why is it that particularly in England, we seem unable to enjoy our food anymore? We are designed to do so; food not only nourishes our bodies but feeds our senses. The French and the Italians will spend hours over a meal, whereas the British seem to have developed an unhealthy relationship with food, which involves quiltily and speedily consuming a meal which then has to be worked off.

Sometimes a quick fix is required but the flip side to the fast food industry has to be the Slow Food Society, 'a non-profit eco-gastronomic organisation' which 'brings together pleasure and responsibility and makes them inseparable'. The Slow Food Society supports quality food brought directly from the producers and has created a worldwide network of Earth markets-farmers markets 'respecting the slow food philosophy' whether its fast or slow, lets bring pleasure back into the experience of eating.

Are we losing our **DIY** skills?

A new university study has confirmed what many of us already knew. When it comes to DIY around the home we are rapidly losing our skills. Almost half of under-30s would not know how to hand wallpaper and a quarter would not be able to change a plug. The over-50s are the exception with almost all of them confident they can do home maintenance.

Skills that were once the norm for our grandparents and parents seem not to have been passed onto the younger generation. The reasons for this are complex but lack of time and interest are often blamed. The Builders' merchant, Wickes has estimated four out of every 10 UK homes have simple DIY jobs started with enthusiasm but sadly languish unfinished. The cost this has on reduced property prices is estimated to be a staggering £35bn.

All this goes to explain why more and more struggling Do-lt-Yourselfers now turn to tradesmen and handymen to do the work for them. Even this has its problems though. How do you find someone who will do quality work at a fair price and actually turn up when they say?

Word of mouth is a good starting point but there are some golden rules that can make all the difference when choosing a tradesman.

- Always select a tradesman who provides their home or business address - if they are local even better, because they have a reputation to keep.
- Be cautious about tradesmen who only

give a mobile telephone number - they can be harder to track down.


- Check to make sure they have up-to-date liability insurance in case things go wrong.
- Ask to speak to some of their previous customers for recommendations.
- Always get either a written estimate or auotation.
- And remember that cheapest is not always





Let's pray we've seen the last of that infernal snow. but I wouldn't bet on it. We once went to the Lakes for an Easter holiday and spent our first day basking in the



The World Needs Your Passion

We hear a lot of wake-up calls about our planet and its future. Climate change, peak oil. We know there is an urgency about the situation and that we are being called upon to act now.

And yet when we look at HOW we're being called upon to act, we can see that the messages so often relate to us as consumers. Individuals who have a duty to make a difference in the privacy of our own individual lives. Turn our lights off, stop flying, don't use plastic bags. These activities are, of course, useful. And yet, all the while that 'consumer' is our primary identity, we are trying to solve our world's crisis with the same level of thinking that created the problems in the first place.

Maybe there is somewhere else to look, and another way to look, and maybe it has something to do with what our true 'duty' is.

We have long associated doing our duty with sacrifice. We have contorted ourselves into jobs which don't suit us and which don't suit humanity or our planet. Meanwhile, our passions have become hobbies – something we do in our spare time, just for us. Following our hearts, responding to our passion's call, have been sneered at as luxuries that only some of us can afford.

So here's another perspective... Our duty is to leave the job we don't enjoy, the lifestyle that doesn't fulfil us, and follow our passion. When we look at how interdependent we humans truly are, we can suddenly see that staying in that unfulfilling job is a selfish act. We can see how not following our passion, not doing what we feel called to do, is selfish. Our duty, in actual fact, is to sacrifice the drudgery, the complaining, the settling and the plodding, and devote ourselves to discovering and acting upon our deepest desire to contribute.

Yes, there have been compelling wake-up calls. Yet as far as I know, no-one has come knocking on your door as you watch TV, thankful for having survived another monotonous day, and looked at you in amazement, shouting: "Excuse me!? What are you doing?? We need you!" They haven't engaged the most magnificent version of you, they haven't called you to step up and be all that you can be and offer that to the world.

Consider these words that knock. That wakeup call you have secretly yearned for – that one which says – you are needed. You are so, so needed. Yes, you are being asked to reduce your carbon footprint. This is vitally important. But you are also being asked to increase your contribution footprint. The kind of footprint your heart is calling for you to leave.

The big lie has been that you don't really matter. We have created a society which has made it so easy to forget that we are needed. Cheap oil has created the foundation for an industrialised nation which has positioned us as consumers instead of contributors. Cheap oil as our primary resource has distracted us from the realisation that we are all precious resources. We have deemed it acceptable to waste our potential, just as we have decided it was okay to squander the planet's natural resources. The truth is: you are one of our planet's natural resources. You are a vital source of energy. You are also a finite resource. One day, you too will run out. We only have a brief moment in history in which to fully experience your unique gifts. Let us use you efficiently while you're still here.

As our society transitions from high-carbon to low-carbon, as humans transition from seeing ourselves as separate to recognising that we are interdependent, I invite you to find your

place within that transition. Hear this as a call of gentle urgency. Not a panic that will blind you and trip you up. Not gentle that lets you disappear quietly back to 'business as usual'. Gently urgent in an "I'm holding you, let's do this, there is no time to lose" way.

"Let's do this" means asking yourself these questions: What are you truly passionate about? When do you feel most alive? What is your unique contribution to our society – that thing that only you can do in exactly the way you do it?

Among us, there are people who can turn old plastics into jewellery, teach children to cook, inspire an MP, design sustainable homes, chair community meetings, give healing massages, forage for wild food, create powerful film documentaries, write songs and make clothes. When we hold back our contribution, our community suffers. We deprive our community, just as we deprive ourselves of the pleasure of offering our gift.

Let's not make up that one gift is more needed than another, someone's talent more 'eco' than someone else's. If we do that, we fall into the same trap of creating hierarchies between species and between people that, again, has caused our problems in the first place. It is not just the obvious environmentally useful skills, such as permaculture, that are

needed in the transition years. We need people who can tell jokes, organise offices, care for children, counsel relationships. People who know how to clean buildings, paint, spread the word, design websites, campaign for justice. There is such truth in that beautiful quote by Howard Thurman: "Do not ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive. The world needs more people who have come alive."

Start right now. Do not wait to find your life's purpose or 'get it right'. Start right now to see yourself as a contributor, not a consumer. If you love writing, put fingers to keyboard or pen to paper. If you love gardening, ask your neighbour if they'd like to learn some new skills. If you work with kids, read them a story about how interconnected all of nature is.

Whether your passion is x or y, j or g, just do it. Do it, do it, and commit to doing it forever. Know that your passion is not just about you, it's about all of us. There really is no more time to waste you.

Spring Clean Your Car by Chris Jackson, CJ Motors

As winter (hopefully) draws to a close a thorough clean of your car can help reduce the risk of long-term damage and maintain the car's value.

EXTERIOR All the grime that has built up over the winter especially the salt needs to be removed with warm water and a suitable car shampoo. Make sure attention is paid to door undersides and sills making sure all shampoo is washed off before drying your car. After drying give your car that much needed polish. This can offer your car some paintwork protection and on older vehicles will help restore any loss of gloss. If you notice any areas of corrosion or chips etc NOW is the time to attend to them, as they will get worse if left. Touch-up kits are available from most accessory shops. If you have extensive corrosion get expert help.

INTERIOR With all the wet shoes going in and out of your car there is a good chance your car has not had chance to dry out properly. Rotted carpets and general shabbiness can seriously reduce a car's resale value. Ideally choose a warm sunny day to remove all mats and shampoo them. Try avoiding using too much water and make sure they are fully dried before replacing.

UNDERSIDE Your car takes the most impact from the weather and salt on our roads. Its this weather that can cause the most corrosion if left over time. Best way is to hose down the whole of your underside and pay very close attention to your cars wheel arch areas. When dry inspect for any signs of damage and get expert advice to correct them.

Don't forget to check your tyres. The legal minimum tread depth is 1.6mm but always replace your tyres for safety reasons before the tread gets below 2mm.

RURAL MATTERS by Rachael Moore



The time we've been preparing for since last October – lambing time!! I'm really excited, it's my favourite time of the year! So many new lives brought into the world.

This year, I've got to take it steady as I have my Chartered exams in a couple of weeks and am supposed to be revising. Not even that will drag me away from lambing time, it's so tiring but as any sheep farmer will tell you, it's rewarding.

It doesn't come without it's challenges though. There's the preparation to prevent the ewes (pregnant mums) from getting Twin Lamb Disease (pregnancy toxaemia). Caused by lack of food intake and energy, the ewes go off their food. Getting calcium, energy and food of any means into them is important. Then there's the ewes that prolapse. This is not pleasant as the ewe pushes the 'lamb bed' out, to put it mildly. This needs to be put gently back inside, or the ewe will get infected and die. Sheep seem to be animals that live to die. They give up too easily!

Anyway, back to the more pleasantries. When a ewe is ready to give birth, she'll paw around in the straw to make a comfy bed. This is followed by laying down and straining, standing

up, laying down, all making room for the lambs to pass through. Then eventually, a 'water bag' will pop out. This is what the lambs are encased in within the ewe. The lamb should arrive in the normal position of front legs first, with head on top, a bit like diving into a swimming pool!! It's when there's a leg back, or no legs, but just the head presented, that we have to intervene. Witnessing such an event is quite emotional – the lamb and sheep's life is in your hands. Those of you that have seen Lambing Live on BBC2 will know what I mean.

Once born, the ewe will lick the lamb to take all the nutrients out of the cleansing, warm the lamb up by breathing on it, with the added bonus of getting the lamb's circulation going by licking with its rough tongue.

The lamb's first drink will be Colostrum, from its' mum. This is a high energy, high nutrient drink containing antibodies it needs to survive. Milk follows through the udder after.

When mother and baby have bonded after a good 24-48 hours, they are returned to the fields, where they flourish. It is so satisfying to see this sight, after all the challenges, a healthy happy lamb is raised.



This most English of teatime treats, served with jam, clotted cream and butter, gives rise to frequent debate over everything from its name, how to serve it, whether is should be with or without sultanas, its nature, texture and recipe.

Lets start with its name – it is most definitely a scone (to rhyme with stone) rather than a scone (to rhyme with gone).

As to serving it, to be honest, once it is there on your plate, split open to reveal its light fluffy centre within a firm crust, still warm from the oven, I'm not really sure it matters what order you pile on the butter, jam or cream - and anyone who spends time at this point debating it, really should be eating something else instead.

The recipe however is critical.

Before you start, here are the 3 things which will make them work every time:

- **1.** Handle as little as possible, and don't use a rolling pin.
- 2. Chill the dough for at least 15 minutes.
- 3. Pre-heat your oven

600g plain flour

150g butter

150g caster sugar (unless you want cheese scones, in which case replace with 150g good hard cheese, grated)

40g baking powder pinch of salt

200ml skimmed milk

200ml soured cream (that's double cream with a squeeze of lemon, left for 5 minutes)

1 egg white

Rub in the butter to the flour, either using the tips of your fingers, a pastry blender, or a food processor, until you have a light mixture with no lumps.

Add the sugar, baking powder and a pinch of salt and stir through. Make a well in the centre of the mixture

Mix the milk and cream together, and pour into the well in the flour and using a flat knife or your hands, quickly mix until the mixture comes together.

Turn onto a lightly floured surface and flatten with your hand until the mix is around 1.5 -2 inches deep Using a cutter (or a tall glass), cut out

the scones, twisting the cutter as you do so, and place an inch or so apart on a baking tray lined with baking parchment or greaseproof paper (or just floured – but don't grease it or you will get soggy bottomed scones).

Put the scones in a cool place (I use the fridge) for at least 15 minutes, and turn on your oven to 200 / 400/ gas mark 6 to pre-heat.

Take the scones out and brush with egg white. Leave 5 minutes and then brush again. Put them into the oven and turn it down to 180 / 350 / gas mark 4

Allow to cook for 15 – 20 minutes – every oven is different, so you may need to take one out and break it open to see if it is ready after around 10 minutes. It should be light and crumbly with a firm crust, and no hint of sogginess.


