


Wedding Superstitions

A load of rubbish... or should you take them seriously?

Much as we may be modern thinkers and dismiss any kind of hocus-pocus as, well, hocus-pocus, most brides do pay a little sneaky regard to superstitions and how they may affect the outcome of the wedding and the marriage.

Being a pragmatic type I have to say that superstitions should not be taken seriously. But then, why do I refuse to walk under a ladder, or feel overjoyed when I find a four-leafed clover?

Let's take a look at some of the more commonly known wedding superstitions - just for the sake of academic interest, of course!

Bows

It seems you should gather together all the bows and ribbons from the wrapping

of your wedding gifts, stick them together into a large bouquet, and hang them over your marital front door for about a year. This apparently brings good luck. It will also bring cobwebs, dust and all manner of other creepy crawlies to your new home. Perhaps pressing all the bows into a flat collage, duly framed with insect-proof glass, would be more appropriate?

Chimney sweep

Many sources say it's good luck if the bride sees, or preferably is kissed by, a chimney sweep on her wedding day. Just be sure you're not wearing your pristine white dress at the time.

Knives as gifts

Jewish traditions say that if you receive knives as gifts; it's bad luck. The remedy is for the recipient to give the donor a coin, so demoting the gift to a business transaction which solves the problem.

Rain on wedding day

This is an interesting one. Many superstitions say it's bad luck if it rains on your wedding day, others say it's good luck. Maybe that depends on which hemisphere you live in, or at least which climate. Those of us who live in chronically rainy Northern Europe should probably assume that rain on our wedding day is just one of those blasted things that we have to deal with whatever event we're organising. However if you're of a romantic frame of mind ... rain

on your wedding day can mean fertility via good news for the farmers' crops. Some cultures say rain on your wedding day means you will have many children. Rice, throwing after

Rice, throwing after ceremony

This tradition goes back quite a long way and

the little rice kernels are supposed to represent fertility despite their being a squillion times larger than reproductive ova. (Confetti and flower petals represent the same thing.) Rice is also a damned nuisance in the yards of wedding ceremony venues because the kernels tend to acquire dampness, swell up and get caught up in the soles of everyone's shoes - especially trainers. Before you allow rice to be thrown, check it out with the powersthat-be at your ceremony to ensure it's permitted.

Right foot forward

This one is a bit like the old children's

superstition, 'Step on a crack, break your grandmother's back.' It seems the bride must step into the wedding ceremony venue with her right foot first for good luck. Just watch you don't catch it in the hem of your dress.

Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue

(And a silver sixpence in her shoe.) It seems this rhyme first emerged in Victorian times, but its origins go back further. The meaning of each item is not clear, but generally it's taken that something old refers to the background of the couple - their friends and family. This is symbolised by the bride wearing something that isn't new. Something new is about the couple's future together, and shouldn't be hard to symbolise as chances are the bride's entire outfit is new - or at least new to her which is all that matters. Something borrowed should be something belonging to a happily married family member so their good fortune carries on to the bride, and some say you should be sure to return the item if you want to avoid bad luck. Yes, even if you borrow your grandmother's diamond earrings. Something blue seems to have a variety of origins including ancient Rome, early Christianity and the Jewish faith. Take your pick.

Finally, the sixpence in your shoe. You would be hard pushed to find a sixpence these days since it was taken out of circulation in 1980. However if you insist on this one you can obtain a silver sixpence (they weren't always made of silver) from this website: www.silver6pence.co.uk



Still wondering about Fairtrade?

The Fairtrade Mark was introduced to guarantee that the producers of bananas, cocoa, tea etc were getting a 'fair' price for the crop. This is because they were basically held to ransom at harvest time to the World market prices and had to accept anything they could get, even if it meant less than they needed to pay for the workers, their land, rent, even food for their families, etc.

The Fairtrade Foundation is 15 years old but the fair trade idea has been around for 40 years or more What has happened to the idea of

What has happened to the idea or Fairtrade during this time?

There are strict monitoring rules before a product gains the Fairtrade Mark, that's why it is so important, and it is the ONLY mark guaranteed to address poverty, not only paying above the market price and never dropping below the agreed minimum figure but also paying a premium which goes to develop the community, schools, housing, whatever they decide is most needed.

There are now thousands of products carrying the Fairtrade Mark, cosmetics, cotton, shoes, footballs, wine, beer etc. The biggest food sales come from bananas and coffee. Supermarkets and coffee chains are embracing the idea responding to consumer choice and demand. This is where individuals play their part, we can't

change the whole world but we can make changes in our own lives and shopping habits which in turn DO make a change for the better in the lives of people at the other side of the world. So in effect you have changed the world albeit a purchase at a time!

One of the more recent increases which had a huge impact on the cocoa farmers in Ghana was when Cadbury changed all the cocoa purchasing for Dairy Milk to Fairtrade. it is hoped that this won't change with the recent take-over.

Fairtrade Towns, Cities, Zones, Counties, Boroughs, Countries, Islands are now all over the world and millions of ordinary people with a conscience come together with a passion to ensure the life that we take for granted can be enjoyed by the people who strive to provide our luxuries.

The impact that the Fairtrade Town movement has had reaches far beyond it's own certified products and by campaigning on ethical and moral issues, the whole consumer business has changed. It may be naive to believe that one day all trade will be fair but surely anyone who answered 'no' to the opening question can doubt that it's good that at least this issue is being addressed







At the time of writing, the Parsonage is in an unusual state of upheaval. Despite being officially 'closed' in January, behind the scenes, the museum is actually having one of its busiest months of the year. It's the time that items in the collections

undergo conservation, rooms are redecorated and repairs carried out, before new exhibitions are created for the coming year. The Brontë artefacts are carefully cleaned and stored away, furniture is checked for woodworm, cleaned and polished with traditional beeswax. Then the real deep clean begins. Staff and volunteers scrub every inch of the house from top to bottom,

washing down woodwork and dusting all the hard to reach nooks and crannies. The empty rooms give the house a unique atmosphere and it is always fascinating to be able to wander the rooms free from the usual displays and security barriers and imagine all the history they contain. This year, there has been even more activity than usual, because we have been carrying out the second stage of a redevelopment project. You might remember that last year the museum's

exhibition room was completely redesigned. This year (with input from local residents who came to a series of special resident's evenings) attention has been turned to some of the period rooms themselves. It's the first time that the

house has had any significant changes since the 1980s so there is a lot of excitement about the final result. Old worn flooring is being ripped up and replaced with new carpeting, walls repainted and new display cases are being installed. It was quite a task to get the old heavy display cabinets out of the museum and across the car park in the snow and ice. When all the redecoration has

taken place, it's time to choose the items that will go out on display. It's always interesting to see the exhibitions coming together, especially with several new artefacts acquired this year that will be shown for the first time, including Emily Brontë's paintbox. Now the rooms are pristine once more and it is time to open the doors to the public. Many staff might feel ready for a holiday after all that hard work, but for the museum it's the start of a new year.



Sumptuous, rich, lavish, indulgent and perfect for spoiling that special someone on Valentine's day – and simplicity itself. So even if you're stunned by their smile and senseless in their presence, you'll still be able to whip this up and watch their knees go weak from the very first mouthful. This is unbelievably good...and if there isn't a special someone to share it with, then all the better – because, after all, you're worth it!

1 block ready made puff pastry (thawed if needed)
150g chocolate (dark or milk, whichever you prefer)
150ml condensed milk
150 ml (or so) double cream, whipped

150 ml (or so) double cream, whipped strawberries, raspberries or cherries to top with – about 20 – 25 at the most

Heat the oven to gas mark 7 /220 / 425

Roll out the pastry into a circle about half an inch deep and place on a floured baking tray.

Cut a heart shape (you might want to cut a template out of paper first and cut around

it if your hands are trembling already....]
With a sharp knife, cut another heart
shape inside the first, about an inch or so
smaller all the way around – but don't cut
all the way through the pastry.
Make diagonal scores across the central
heart shape and bake for around 15
minutes until crisp and risen, but not burnt!
Take out of the oven and, while still warm,
gently lift away the top layers of pastry
from the INNER heart shape. This will leave
you a heart shaped shell.

Once this has cooled, melt the chocolate and condensed milk together in the microwave on full power for 1 minute. Take out and stir very well until the mixture becomes smooth and glossy. Spread mixture inside the tart.

Whip the double cream and spread around the inside inch or so of the tart shell, and decorate with the berries and any heart shaped trimmings from the spare pastry.

Best eaten horizontal with a large spoon and a daft grin on your face. **Nel Harqrave**















I unique set of greetings cards has been published locally to raise funds for the Peruvian Charity "Casa Ninos Hogar del Sol" (Children's Home - Hearth of the Sun). The cards have been designed by primary school children in Pachar, in the Sacred Valley of Peru, and show their interpretation of "the world I want to grow up in". The cards were printed locally for free - as an act of philanthropy. This means that 100% of the profits will go back to the charity. The charity that benefits is based in Ollantaytambo (a train stop away from Machu Picchu), and is focused on ensuring that children who live at altitude get enough to eat, a balanced diet, and stay warm. A balanced diet at 3,000m plus is a challenge - thousands of varieties of potato grow there, but

vegetables don't. So the charity builds greenhouses and kitchens attached to the schools that the children have to walk up to 3 hours per day to attend. One such development has already been built at a school / community hub at T'astayoc and is providing healthy meals for over 100 children each day. Another is now planned at Pachar.







TOP TECH TIPS

Being the adventurous sort I usually cope with the challenges bad weather brings. As the Council's Grit supplies dwindled recently, I had to admit that the 1-in-4 hill near my house was not safe to drive on at times. We switched to the bus for the daily school/office run for a few days last month, but then the school closures finally triggered my inner 'Grumpy Old Woman' to come out singing:-

Oh the weather outside is shocking, And the roads are all gridlocking. Dropping kids off at school is 'no-go'. Flippin' Ice! Blinkin' Slush! Bl***y Snow!

While kids aren't exactly disappointed if school's closed, I am! In a small business like ours it's 'all hands to the pump' most of the time. Work can't stop just because of a bit of snow, or anything else, so solid fall-back plans are essential.

Making the most of currently available technology, really can mean 'Business As Usual' from the comfort of home.
Remote Desktop Services is built into Windows Business/Professional Editions.
Apple sell their own Remote Desktop as an add-on to Mac OS X. Both enable you to work as if you are sitting right in front of a computer that could be anywhere in the world. You need a broadband internet connection between the computer, laptop or mobile client device you are using (yes, even some mobile phones are capable!) and the remote host computer in your office.

Some business networks and Professional/Business Edition Windows PCs are already configured to allow remote desktop connectivity. In some cases you can even wake up your computer if it's powered off!

If your office computer is Windows Home Edition or MacOS, or your business network is not configured to allow direct connections through, there are a number of third-party software solutions enabling you to set up a connection quickly and easily, many via a web browser, with very little technical knowledge needed.

Most products are downloadable. In some cases they offer basic functionality free of charge. If you want to do more, e.g. printing from your office computer to your home computer's local printer, hear audio, or transfer files between the two, you should probably go for a fully licensed product/subscription.

A word of caution though – in businesses where client confidentiality and data security are essential, high level encryption may be required, or remote working may be completely inappropriate. Getting your employer's permission to 'remote desktop' is essential!

Why not ask your boss about building your fall-back plan ready for the next time bad weather or childcare problems disrupt your ability to reach the office?

Carry On Farmina

When you think of farming, you think of cows grazing in a lush green field, or gathering the hay in the hot sunshine. It's been a different story more recently... We all need water to live, but in excess

we can't manage this natural asset. November was a particularly wet month, with heavy downpours causing rivers and streams to flash flood, then back up and flood yet more land. With the land being underwater, some crop damage is evident once



the water has receded. Brown puddles last for a month or so, with the grass having gone slimy underwater.

Then there's the animals. There's a farmer who I know very well, who keeps a close eye on the downfalls and any hint of heavy rain and the lambs are moved to higher ground. One particular Sunday. just as we were supplementary feeding the sheep and hoggs, a brief glance down the valley spurs a Lamb Moving Session. The river was at a level with the banking and ready to burst at any point. Gathering up 200 or so lambs with two men (well, one lady) and a sheepdog against the driving rain was not going to be easy. The lambs were well sheltered under a belt of trees, not knowing this was one of the lower fields in the valley bottom. Getting them to shift was not welcomed, even with the dog. Eventually, after a lot of arm waving and shouting at the lambs, they began to 'trail' the way we wanted. The aim being to get every lamb safe and sound on higher ground at the field furthest away from where we were... Sunday Lunch was

looking more like Sunday Tea. I was really impressed by the sheepdog. She was well practised at this routine, keeping a good fifty feet to my left and the farmer another fifty feet to her left. If any lambs tried to make a break, she had them covered as

they were soon returned to the rest of the flock. The rain got stronger and the winds colder, by heck we felt it as we were already soaked to the skin, but we had to carry on the river had now burst its banks and was running into the fields where the photo James Hutton lambs were. Soon, the

wool was drenched and we all know how heavy this can be when its wet. The lambs got slower, we got more tired, but had to press on. Some of the lambs stopped and refused to go any further. There was nothing else for it, they had to be taken to higher ground one way or another. So, they got a free ride. Some in the LandRover and the odd few carried by the farmer over his shoulder. With the river getting higher there was no time for messing about. You have to admire that in a farmer. A job needs doing, so they just get on with it. No moaning, even in these conditions.

We finally got the lambs to the higher field. They were all gathered together and fed supplementary feed to boost their energy. At least we knew they were safe and wouldn't be washed away. Following the downpours of rain causing widespread flooding, comes the gentle white snow flakes. They don't cause any harm, I hear you say... I love snow. Everything looks so clean and refreshing, especially when it's sunny. Then again, I don't have to work in it every day.




