




My husband's definition of a perfect summer day is when the sun is shining, the breeze is blowing, the birds are singing, and the lawn mower is broken!

BEHIND THE SCENES AT THE MUSEUM by Jenna Holmes

There was much excitement this month when the Brontës' piano was played for

the first time at the Parsonage in over 160 years. The piano was taken away for conservation in 2009. We knew it. would be a delicate iob, but no-one, not even the restorer Ken Forrester. knew just how complicated it would be. Important parts of the instrument were missing or damaged, and the bits that remained were covered with a century's worth of soot and dust. Ken's

original plan was to find a piano of similar type and age to take apart and model his repairs on. But the 'Cabinet Piano', despite being popular in the 1830s and 1840s, is now a very rare instrument indeed. His searches led him to the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, but still he found very little useful information and Ken had to completely rebuild the piano from scratch, creating new pieces as he went along. It has taken him almost a year.

We don't know how or when the Brontës bought their piano, or how Patrick might have afforded such an expensive instrument. Branwell learnt to play the church organ, so it was perhaps to develop

his talent that the family decided to buy one. The Brontës had been inspired by the

1834 concert for the new St Michael's Church organ, where Handel's Messiah had been played. But it was Emily who went on to become the pianist of the family, playing 'with precision and brilliancy'. Charlotte was too shortsighted to play the piano, and Anne preferred to sing. The piano was sold with all of the other Brontë belonainas at auction after Patrick's death. It. passed through

many hands, but was eventually returned to the Parsonage on the death of its owner, J.H. Dixon, in 1916.

Since then, the piano has stood silently in Mr Brontë's study, until its restoration and grand unveiling in June 2010, when a pianist from the Royal Northern College of Music came to play it, accompanied by a soprano singer. Music chosen from the music books in the museum collection rang throughout the house and into the garden – Clementi, Beethoven and Handel. We are planning a series of special musical evenings at the Parsonage, where we will give people the opportunity to hear musical recitals on the Brontës' piano on a regular basis.

Lashings and lashings of ginger beer...

Along with swallows, cream teas, cucumber sandwiches and the thwock of wimbledon ball on racquet, ginger beer is a taste which defines a truly English summer.

Ginger Beer is traditionally served in a peculiarly 1950s measure called a "lashing", although in fact the Famous Five enjoyed lashings of treacle and lashings of boiled eggs at various points, but never actual lashings of your actual ginger beer.

But we won't let the prosaic truth get in the way of a spiffing piece of nostalgic folklore; here's a dashed fine recipe for a delicious summer drink (which also goes extremely well with that other English summer staple -Pimms)

A 2 -inch chunk of root ginger, finely chopped to fill around 3 tablespoons (no need to peel it) 1 unwaxed lemons, chopped or thinly sliced 1 teaspoon of cream of tartar

250g caster sugar

34 teaspoon dried yeast

An empty 2 litre plastic bottle and it's lid, (such as a large fizzy drink bottle) – please don't use glass!

(NB: make this the day before you plan to drink it)

Put the ginger, sugar, lemon and cream of tartar in a large pan and add 750ml cold water. Bring slowly to the boil, stirring occasionally to make sure the sugar is dissolved.

Once boiling, turn down and simmer for 10 minutes. Add another 1 and a half litres of cold water and stir well. Sprinkle the yeast on top, and cover the pan with a lid, or some tin foil and leave to cool for several hours or

Wash the bottle in hot soapy water, and rinse well. Pour the ginger beer through a sieve and then into the bottle (a funnel is useful for this, or you can make a temporary one from a smaller plastic bottle with the bottom cut off) Make sure there is at least a 5cm gap between the top of the liquid and the bottle cap. Tighten it well, and then every few hours release and retighten the cap. You will see the bubbles start to form from the top down after a few hours.

Keep in a cool place and drink the next day over crushed ice, with a slice of lime, while waiting for Dick, Julian, George, Anne and Timmy the Dog to drag you off on your next adventure!

BTW, be careful when opening the bottle; slowly let out the fizz, and what ever you do, don't shake it! www.worthbaking.co.uk



Paint the Perfect Dream







RURAL MATTERS by Rachael Moore

Make Hay whilst the Sun Shines!

The recent dry spell has been a blessing to farmers looking to gather winder feed for livestock. More recent trends of collecting the grass have been in the form of silage, either chopped and stored in a great heap in a 'clamp', or in the form of round bales wrapped in thick cling film type material. Both storage methods, require all air to be squeezed out of the grass to enable fermentation.

Making silage, is less weather dependant with just a couple of rain free days required from mowing to gathering. Once the grass has been mown, it is left to wilt for about 24 hours, where it will then be 'rowed up', by a machine towed by tractor, with two big spinning wheels. From here, the grass is either gobbled up by a forager, which chops the grass to about 3 inch long lengths, then shoots it out of a spout into a tractor and trailer running along side. The grass is then tipped into the clamp. Alternatively, the grass rows, are gobbled up by a round baler, which rolls the grass up into a 4ft diameter round bale, tied together by string, or net wrap. To preserve the grass, it is then mechanically wrapped in cling film.


Making hay is more intensive, and more dependant upon the weather. You may recall having seen those square bales of hay in the fields. 24 hours after mowing, the grass is spread out to wilt further in the sun to make a drier forage. A few hours later it will be turned again, until it gets the right texture, still being slightly green, but thoroughly dried out. Then it is rowed up, and baled into rectangular bales, tied with two strings. This is then man



handled onto a trailer and stored in the barn, wrap is not required.

This brings back memories of my childhood where we used to haymake and it was the job of the children to roll the bales to the trailers, where the adults would then throw the bales up onto the stack. It was an entire village event, there's be about five families all coming to help, because it was a great social event too, as well as being one of the most important events for a farmers to gather the winter feed. The children of the families would happily run around in the field making dens, making an obstacle course, and of course helping out to demolish any picnics!

Now, with the more popular method of making silage, the social aspect is not as prominent, and the number of tractors required, is too dangerous for children to play in a working field. Yet, gathering silage, or hay making requires a number of people and all hangs on the weather – the Countryfile weather forecast is still watched with anticipation!!

IN THE GARDEN with Mike Cunningham

JULY

Midsummer, and the flowerbeds are awash with vibrant. coloured annuals.

Summer bedding is at its best. This month is a time to relax, to enjoy not only the richness of the flowers but also the delicious scents of summer. It is a time for sitting in the shade, having an outdoor meal.

Roses:

Continue to water and feed using a rose fertiliser feed. Spray against black spot, greenfly, rust and mildew. Tie in new shoots cutting out any

spindly looking ones. Don't forget to deadhead regularly and remove suckers (suckers tend to develop at the base of the rose below the ground level).

Lawns:

Mow at least once a week keeping edges trimmed for a good-looking lawn. Spike compacted lawns to aerate. Do not apply chemical treatments during dry and hot weather conditions unless you water copiously after.

Flowering Plants:

Continue to cut back early flowering perennials. Apply a general fertiliser to invigorate a tired looking plant. Autumn flowering bulbs and sweet william etc can be planted in prepared beds. Regularly deadhead flowering plants especially annuals. Now's a good time to plan and order your spring bulbs.

Vegetables:

Continue to water and hoe between plants. Pinch out any side shoots from tomatoes except bush type verities and start feeding twice a week using a liquid fertiliser when the yellow flowers have formed a pea size tomato. Complete planting of broccoli, brussel spouts, leek and winter cabbage etc. Early potatoes should be lifted.

> Towards the end of month onions and shallots can also be lifted and dried ready for storing

Container Plants:

Container grown plants can dry out very quickly this month, regular watering by any means to maintain moisture at the plant roots is essential. If going

on holiday make arrangements for a friend or neighbour to water or alternatively move container to a shady part of the garden.

House Plants:

Discard or replace plants that are past their best. Continue watering and feeding plants. Try to provide as much humidity as possible on hot days by standing near a saucer or bowl of water. Clean leaves of foliage type plants using a damp cloth.

TOP TECH TIPS by Michelle Thompson of CloudFree IT

More of us than ever before are making use of the internet for daily tasks (banking, shopping, communicating) as well as our leisure needs (TV. radio & movies on demand, music downloads, chatting with friends & family, researching, gambling). Good things a plenty - there for the asking!. Unfortunately there's bad things there for the taking too!

Kids learn about safe web-surfing in school, but for those of us for whom the pocket calculator was 'a wonder to behold' the internet may feel like stepping into an alien world...

Common-sense, vigilance and following these Golden Rules can minimise the risk to you, your data and your computer.

- 1. Create a standard user account with limited privileges for web surfing. Save the administrator level account for doing only those tasks which require Admin privileges (e.g. installing software).
- 2. Always use strong passwords. Change them often. A strong password includes a mix of letters (both upper & lowercase) & numbers and should be hard to guess. Avoid using dates or names of family or pets. Where possible include special characters (symbols) too making your password even harder to crack.
- 3. Always use Security Software and remember the 'Rule of One' - one anti-virus. one anti-spyware, one firewall product (or one combined internet security product). More than one of each type does not provide better protection - they can interfere with each other.
- 4. Watch out for malware posing as anti-virus/anti-spyware products. Pop up infection warnings from a product you don't recognise, asking for credit card


details should set alarm bells ringing! **5.**Occasionally run an online virus scan to check for infections your resident protection may have missed (sadly it happens - no AV software is perfect!) 6. If your broadband router has firewall functionality use it as well as using one computer firewall (either Windows Firewall or one included in an internet security suite - not both - see 'Rule of One' above).

- 7. Keep ALL your PC software up to date -INSTALL UPDATES NOW! Don't delay.
- 8. Be smart about where you visit and what you click on. Stick to well-known sites. Avoid free downloads except those recommended by sites or people you trust. In particular, avoid those 'sites of special interest' (yes, you know the ones I mean!) Many contain ILLEGAL material as well as viruses.
- **9.** Pay for music and movie downloads! Avoid Peer to Peer file sharing services it's ILLEGAL to share copyrighted music & videos -see last month's Top Tips.
- 10. Do not open email attachments from users that you do not know - DELETE THEM IMMEDIATELY!
- 11. Use an alternative browser (Firefox. Opera, Safari etc.) Hackers target Internet Explorer more than any other browser. If you would rather stick to IE make sure it is well-secured.
- 12. Be on your guard in chat rooms don't divulge personal information, even if the person you are chatting to sounds genuine. Fraudsters are patient - taking time to extract information by asking seemingly innocent questions. You wouldn't tell a stranger in the street your bank details, date of birth, phone number or address, would you? Happy WebSafe Surfing!


