How does your garden grow

Nearly another growing season over with the blink of an eye but still plenty of jobs to do in the garden. Finish harvesting the last of your peas and beans and then just dig in the old roots as they are rich in nitrogen. Harvest pumpkins, marrow and squashes before the frost makes them soft. Dry off your onion sets and harvest those late potatoes.

Check your winter cabbage, cauliflower and brussel sprouts, removing any yellow leaves. Now is the last time to plant your spring cabbage. Plant Autumn onion sets now to get early crops from next June.

Once you have finished harvesting start digging in manure and organic matter to put some goodness back into the soil. Remember you only get out what you put in. Dig over the soil and leave it for the winter elements to breakdown.

Rake all fallen leaves from your lawns as they will make good compost, but left on the lawn will make it die.

Clear the greenhouse out for the winter and disinfect to stop pests and diseases over wintering in it. Once cleaned out move in any tender plants from the garden. Why not take some pelargonium or geranium cuttings from your old plants?

Now is the time to plant your spring flowering bulbs like tulips, daffodils,

crocus, hyacinths etc. There is such a brilliant selection of varieties and colours to choose from at such reasonable prices. Plant your spring bedding plants such as pansies, polyanthus, myosotis, bellis and wallflowers. These will give a tremendous splash of colour in the spring. The brilliant thing about spring bedding plants is that they flower year after year if left undisturbed during the summer. Winter flowering pansies tend to flower throughout the whole year. If they become stragley just cut the plant right back to allow the plant to produce new growth.

Cut back herbaceous perennials once they have died back to allow the new growth to come through. Move or divide any plants now to avoid disturbing in the spring when the new growth starts to appear.

Finally why not try to collect, dry out and save some of your own seeds to grow next year.

Things like this make gardening so interesting and exciting.

SUPPORTING REFUGEES IN CRISIS

It has been impossible to avoid the growing refugee crisis in Europe, but just how best to respond is unclear. The Churches Together group along with many others have been collecting tents, sleeping bags and clothing to ship over to Calais and other camps through organisations such as Calaid and Leedsnoborders. This picture (below) shows just some of the generous donations dropped off at



Haworth Parish church.

We now want to harness the energy and compassion our amazing communities have shown so far in two new ways as winter draws near.

Around £650 can provide a fully winterproof tent, for up to 8 people, with woodburner for cooking and heating – similar to the ones you might see on TV coverage of UNHCR refugee camps. We want to work with 20 other towns and communities to each fund a tent –

The Worth Valley Tent Project. We will kick off the project with fundraising and a live music event at Cobbles & Clay on Haworth Main Street, Thursday, October 22nd, at 7:30pm.

The second way you can show your support is through making up food bags – just a large carrier bag containing enough for a person for a few days: 500g rice or couscous,



2 tins tuna (easy open are the best), a tetra pack (or can) of kidney beans and tomatoes, 1L tetrapack of longlife milk, small bag of sugar, 250g dates, some cereal bars, 20 tea bags, a toothbrush, toothpaste, soap/showergel, and if you like, a note to the recipient. (Pack sizes guides only - and please, nothing which needs a microwave or oven). This is a really efficient way of distributing food by churches and charities working on the ground without further sorting. Please drop these into St. Michael's Parish Church, Haworth or Damside Mill in Crossroads, (call/ text Nel on 07835 115900 or email worthvalleytentproject@gmail.com) Please continue to remember that refugees are real people, like you and me, who are being affected terribly by events outside their control. Act with generosity and compassion. When the best course of action is unclear, I usually resort to some words of the prophet Micah who suggested: "What does the Lord require of you? 

Keighley & Worth Valley Railway

When our founders met to propose reopening the railway, just months after British Railways decided to close the line, one of their aims was not to lose such an important lifeline for the local community.

In the intervening fifty years, we have become a key part of the visitor economy in the district, but we are very mindful of our neighbour's needs. With this in mind, we are very pleased that in the depths of winter, even when the local roads are closed, we can offer locals a safe route

in an out of the village of Oxenhope, we are always looking for other ways to serve and support the local community. Last year we responded to requests to open the buffet at Oxenhope station even when the trains are not running and so now Christine and her team are open Wednesdays to

Fridays (as well as operational days) all year round, providing an inviting location for a quick cup of tea and a chat, a sandwich or a hot snack. We are working to introduce a loyalty scheme for our regulars, so please check on kwvr.co.uk/explore/daily-food-drink/ for the latest news on this development.



Oakworth to Keighley via Newsholme Dene & Holme House Woods

A walk with a good mix of fields and woodland, ending in the suburbs of Keighley.

Walk start point:

Oakworth bus terminus (Low Bank).

Please note the bus may stand a few minutes at Windsor Road. Oakworth which is one stop prior to the terminus at Low Bank.

Start by walking uphill from the bus stop to the junction with Wide Lane, here turn left along Wide Lane passing Oakworth Cricket Club on the right and the Crematorium on the left all the way to the next 'T' junction with Slack Lane. At the junction with Slack Lane cross the road and go over the stile in the dry stone wall opposite the main gate of Oakworth Crematorium.

Once over the stile follow the footpath downhill as it bears left across the field to a stile near the bottom of the stone wall on your far left. Go over the stile and across the bridge which can be

seen ahead, then go through another stile on the opposite side of the bridge and follow the path uphill, keeping the dry stone wall on your right.

As the field levels out continue straight ahead towards the houses in front of you. On nearing the garden wall of the houses look out for the stile in the dry stone wall on your right. Go through the stile and turn left along the double walled field track down the side of a house to the junction with a narrow

surfaced road.

Turn left along the narrow road turning right uphill where it joins the main road, opposite Green End Farm. Afteronly a short distance the road turns left, leave the road here and climb the stone steps ahead, which are between the post box and the entrance to Cliffe Farm. Follow the stone paved path along the side of the house and through the back yard, out

onto the rough surfaced road. Turn left then first right up the narrow unsurfaced road between the houses, bearing left behind the houses along the grass track. After approximately 200 yds/185m the track bends to the left, leave the track here by turning right through the second gap in the wall on the right.

Once over the stile the path goes straight ahead for a short distance before dropping steeply downhill into the woodland below. At the bottom of the woodland go through a gate into a field (Newsholme Dene), continuing straight ahead and across a

> packhorse bridge. Take a look at the old clapper footbridge here on your right before continuing by following the field track as it bears to the right through a gate, gently climbing to meet a more well-defined track near to a


few houses.

Bear right here along the track, following the top edge of the fields before bearing left uphill at the converted farm building (Newsholme Dene Barn). Continue up the track for a short distance, where, at the rear of the next converted farm (Rose Cottage), we rejoin the footpath by turning right off the track to walk behind the former farm building.

Continue along the footpath, which is paved in places and often slippery, as it goes gently downhill into the woodland. After a short distance the path divides, take the path to the left walking on the level through the trees parallel to Dene Beck in the valley below. Nearing the end of the woodland the path passes an old mill dam on the right, before crossing a bridge over the Mill Race and eventually crossing a second bridge spanning Dene Beck, CONTINUED ON PAGE 18

Turn left along the road walking through the hamlet of Goose Eye, leaving via a very steep climb up the road. Continue uphill beyond the first right hand bend where, ahead, a stile in the stone wall near the sharp left hand bend will provide a short cut up into the centre of the village of Laycock.

Turn right along the main road for approximately 150yds/138 m, before turning sharp right off the road down a track opposite Dial House.

Continue following the track downhill, noting as you go the horse trough built into the stone wall on your left. Just beyond the trough the track turns right, continue on down for a short distance to the next right hand bend, near to the metal gates. Here rejoin the footpath by leaving the track on the bend to walk straight ahead down the stone steps following the narrow path steeply downhill into Holme House Woods.

Follow the path along the valley bottom keeping the beck on your right as it meanders through Holme House Wood, crossing streams and through stiles, eventually reaching 'Tinker Bridge' (a metal footbridge spanning the now re-named 'North Beck').

Turn right and cross Tinker Bridge to follow the footpath straight ahead uphill keeping close to the trees, bushes and broken down drystone wall on your right. As you near the top end of the field climb the grass covered stone steps and go through the stile to walk along the narrow path enclosed between the fence and the drystone wall before going through a second stile out onto Fell Lane. Here turn left to walk downhill on the lefthand side of the road for approximately 400vds (364m) before turning left onto Holme Mill Lane. Immediately after turning onto Holme Mill Lane turn right and cross the road to walk down Wingate Avenue. At the bottom of Wingate Avenue, at its junction with Holme Wood Lane, cross over the road bearing to the left to walk along the paved path diagonally between the grassed area and the bungalows, to join Raglan Avenue.

Bear right along Raglan Street to its junction with an unmade road and turn left to go through or around the side of the large metal gates, marked 'no through road, vehicular access to Castle Mills only'. Walk down the rough concreted narrow road passing some wasteland and a derelict building on the left. Go through or around another set of large metal gates to walk parallel with the North Beck before negotiating the metal barrier at the end of the road out into Becks Boad. Here bear right along the old stone setts to the end of Becks Road and its junction with Oakworth Road then turn left to return to Keighlev town centre and the main bus station.

Behind the Scenes at the Museum

This month we meet the Museum's Learning Officer Sue Newby



Tell us a little about yourself:

I'm originally from south of Manchester and used to work at Quarry Bank Mill, a National Trust property in Cheshire. I love Haworth and the surrounding countryside and moved here to take this job.

How long have you worked at the Museum?

I've worked here for over 10 years, which seems really hard to believe!

Tell us about a typical day:

I usually work with a group of visitors who have chosen to have a talk, workshop, or guided walk as part of their visit – often with one of my volunteers to help me. The workshops can include drama or creative writing, and the talks can be on a whole range of aspects of the Brontës. The group could be young school children or University of the 3rd Age or anything in between, so there is certainly variety in my 'typical' day!

What's your favourite piece in the collection?

Emily's Diary Paper which she wrote with her sister Anne in 1834. We think of Emily as this rather intense writer of Wuthering Heights, but her diary papers show a different side to her.

And your favourite Brontë novel?

It's got to be either Wuthering Heights or Jane Eyre. Jane Eyre is the book I come back to most often; it's got an atmosphere all of its own and it draws me in totally. But Wuthering Heights is such an enigmatic, captivating story; it's full of unforgettable images and surely no-one has ever written about our landscape like Emily does. Oh, and it's got Heathcliff! So I'm going to say Wuthering Heights.

Anything else you'd like to tell us?

Like everyone else at the Parsonage I'm excited by our Brontë200 celebrations which start next year with the 200th anniversary of Charlotte Brontë's birth. I'm particularly looking forward to our creative partnership with Haworth Primary School and Kala Sangam.

In the meantime, we have plenty planned for this month, with special Museums at Night openings and half-term activities. Please check www.bronte.org.uk for details.

Finally, we couldn't achieve half the education work we do here if it wasn't for our dedicated team of volunteers. We've just heard that they've won the regional prize of the Marsh Award for Volunteers in Museum Education, organised by the British Museum - wonderful news!



GUYTRASHI

The spectre of the black, terrifying hound crops up in folklore all over the country – here in West Yorkshire we call it the Guytrash.

Though usually a dog, it can also take on other forms; Branwell Brontë once describing it as a "flaming barrel, rolling across fields" and in Todmorden they believed it could also take the form of a dirty, white rag, hanging from a tree... As children, the Brontës loved supernatural tales and Charlotte even includes a Guytrash in Jane Eyre. She imagines one loping towards her out of the twilight, but it turns out to be Mr Rochester's harmless pet, Pilot. But if it had been a Guytrash, what might have befallen Jane? Sometimes the Guytrash was thought of as a guardian, but it could also be an omen



of death, and might even attack its victims. You probably wouldn't want to follow such a creature, but if you did, it was known to turn towards you and "walk backwards, with its large red eyes fixed fully on its pursuer." With the coming of the mills and streetlights, sightings of the Guytrash became fewer and fewer, but you never know... maybe we should be on the look-out for big black dogs this Halloween!

What Happens When a Person **Dies Without a Will?**

Where a person dies leaving no Will (or no valid Will) at the date of their death, they have died intestate. This means that the law will dictate who will receive the deceased's estate and this is dependent on whether or not the deceased was married and had children or other relatives, such as parents, brothers, sisters, nieces or nephews.

Where a person dies leaving a spouse

but no children, the surviving spouse will inherit the whole estate.

However, where the deceased left a spouse and children, the distribution of the estate will

Spouse

- Personal chattels
- A fixed net sum of £250,000 plus interest from the date of death to the date of payment
- 50% of the net residuary estate

Children

• 50% of the net residuary estate in equal shares contingent on them attaining the age of 18 years (or earlier marriage) - if any child of the deceased dies before the deceased, but leaves children of their own, they will take by substitution the share which their parent would have otherwise taken at the age of 18 years (or earlier marriage)

Where the deceased died leaving no spouse, only children, then the children will take the estate in equal shares at age 18 (or earlier marriage).

If the deceased died leaving no spouse or children then the estate will pass to the following relatives in the order set out below: -

- Parents
 - Brothers and sisters of the whole blood* or their children
 - · Brothers and sisters of the half blood** or their children
 - Grandparents
 - Uncles and aunts of the whole blood or their children
 - Uncles and aunts of the half blood or their children
- The Crown, the Duchy of Lancaster or the Duke of Cornwall as the case may be
- *whole blood means sharing the same parent
- * * half blood means sharing one common parent

Please note that one category above must be exhausted before the next category can inherit, so for example, if the deceased died leaving no surviving spouse or children but one surviving parent, that surviving parent will take everything and nothing will pass to surviving brothers or sisters of the whole blood.


